### **English**

In English we will be finishing the book 'Kick' by Mitch Johnson and then beginning our new book 'Wonder' by R.J Palacio. This book explores a number of great themes as the children begin to approach their end of primary school and transitioning to high school at the end of the year.

We will also be working hard to finish our suspense narratives inspired by the animation 'Alma' which we started last term before concentrating on Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar in preparation for the end of KS<sub>2</sub> SATs tests in May.



### Maths

During this half-term, we will look a number areas of the Year 6 maths curriculum: of finding area and perimeter of rectangles

Area and Perimeter: IN this unit we will recap looking at finding the area and perimeter of shapes such as triangles and parallelograms.

Volume: This unit will give us the opportunity to apply our knowledge of times tables to finding the volume of cuboids and solving related problems.

Geometry: This unit will give us the opportunity to recap coordinates but also look at how these change during translations and reflections. This unit also allows us to apply our knowledge of polygons as we draw these shapes.

On top of this we will spend a large amount of time recapping multiple other areas of the KS2 curriculum in preparation for the SATs tests.

## Art - Sculpture - the human form

In this unit we will look at drawing techniques to give our drawings depth. We will learn how to:

- Use pencils and other media to create marks and lines.
- Use modelling materials to create human forms in the style of an
- Draw accurate representations of sculptures from the Sainsbury Centre Collection.
- Talk confidently and make comparisons between the art of the 4 studied artists.



## History - Why was it said that the sun never set on the **British Empire?**

In this unit the children will:

- Identify and describe the extent of the British Empire in 1921 and explain what it meant to be a colony;
- Describe and explain the main reasons why Britain wanted an empire and evaluate and justify their choice of those factors that they consider were most significant;
- Interpret a range of evidence to reach a conclusion and make a judgment as to why the British Empire has all but disappeared;
- **Identify and describe** the countries that currently belong to the Commonwealth and explain the purposes and benefits of being part of this organisation.

### Football
